#### WHAT'S SO GOOD ABOUT GOOD FRIDAY

Due to the release schedule of the Messenger, and the date of Easter, you may be reading this a few days past Easter, but to me, it is never too late to read a Good Friday/Easter message. I have been asked this question a few times, "Since Good Friday is about the death of Jesus, why do we call it "Good"? – Good question!

Looking back on the day many things come to mind: jeering crowds, lying witnesses, spineless politicians, Jesus' black and swollen eyes, crown of thorns, whipped within inches of His life, spear in the side, and finally death. Add to all of this the broken heart of his mother, Mary; the confused and scared disciples; the earthquake; and people coming out of the grave. Nothing sounds good about any of this. Good Friday? What good? We might think "Black Friday" is more fitting than "Good Friday". Dark Friday? Yes. Suffering Friday? Yes. Long Friday? Yes. But what triumphs all of this should still be the description: Good Friday.

Behind all the ugliness of Good Friday, stood the Lord in heaven who knew (as well as Jesus) that the cross had to be on the road to the resurrection. Behind Good Friday was the purpose that all sin, present and future, had to be atoned for only through the shed blood of Jesus. The perfect lamb sacrificed for all imperfect sheep. "We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each has turned to his own way; and the Lord had laid on Him (Jesus) the iniquity of us all." (Isaiah 53:6)

For Christians, Good Friday is an important day of the year because it celebrates what we believe to be the most important weekend in the history of the world. The cross and the resurrection are eternally tied together. No cross, no resurrection. No resurrection, no Christianity. No price paid on the cross, no salvation possible. Paul wrote, "Of first importance that Jesus died for our sins, was buried, and was raised to life on that day, following what God had promised in the scripture (I Corinthians 15:3). On Good Friday, we must realize that Jesus willingly suffered and died by crucifixion and because he paid the price for our sins, we do not have to, AND forgiveness of our sins and eternal life are waiting for us to crucify (die to) ourselves and give our life over to Him. <u>A</u>dmit we are a sinner, <u>B</u>elieve in the death and resurrection, and <u>C</u>onfess that we want Him as our savior and surrender to Him.

Good Friday is good because as terrible as the day was, it had to happen for us to receive the joy of Easter. On Good Friday, both rath and mercy met at the cross. God's wrath on sin and God's mercy because when we give our life to God, he extends his mercy, and we never have to pay the price for our sin. Jesus paid it all, all to him I owe, sin had left a crimson stain, but he washed it white as snow!
